# Humanities BA(Hons)

## Year 1

In your first year you take six modules that help develop the skills central to your course.

- The Politics of Representation

## Year 2 and 3

In year 2 you choose two specialist pathways to follow for the rest of your degree. You'll also take the core module Critical Traditions where you will explore some of the key debates and concepts in history, culture, politics and philosophy, and start researching your dissertation project which you complete through Year 3.
