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Research Centre Directors' Reflections

The annual report is always a valuable opportunity to take stock of the year just gone while also looking forward to the new academic year. Highlights of the last year included the PG conference; the public Bristol650 events; the academic conferences organised by our medievalists; and our panels and reception at the Leeds IMC. All these took place alongside the regular reading groups and a busy programme of research seminars, which were remarkably well-attended.

Given the economic climate in universities, it is a challenging time for the Arts and Humanities, especially in taught postgraduate programmes. We noted last year that recruitment to the MA had fallen below sustainable levels, and with minimum numbers in our newly merged Faculty now set at 20, the MA in Medieval Studies was withdrawn. We are in active discussions with the Heads of School and the PGT Directors to ensure that taught provision in medieval studies remains available for MA students in years to come. In the past, we also used the core Masters units to provide PGR training, but alternative ways of meeting this need are already available without the restrictions of a credit-bearing unit.

The future of medieval studies at Bristol otherwise looks bright. Like last year, we welcome a bright cohort of new PhD students and early career researchers as postdocs and newly appointed lecturers (see below, sections 2 and 8). Our research environment is strengthened by the international visitors who join us each year (see below for details) and become part of our community for short visits – and we hope that when they return, they will sing our praises elsewhere. We would also like to express our appreciation

for the contributions honorary and emeritus staff make to the running of the Centre and to the success of our events, often willingly acting as specialist consultants to postgraduates and others in our community, enriching the research environment.


There are always changes in the executive committee and we extend our thanks especially to the two outgoing postgraduate representatives, Abi Weaver and Ben Cattle, and to our intern, Shauna Roach, who has done so much to support our activities in the year just gone and who fortunately remains on the CMS executive committee. We also welcome Tristan Kay as the new Co-Director with Ad Putter, who continues in this role for one more year. We have found leading the CMS to be hugely rewarding role, not least because of the wonderful colleagues and students we work with, and we are confident that Tristan will find it so too.



Arrivals and Departures

We are delighted to welcome **Dr Harriet Soper** who joined us on 1 January 2024 as Lecturer in Old English literature. Prior to her appointment she was Simon and June Li Fellow in English Literature at Lincoln College Oxford. She is particularly interested in the ways that humans are drawn into intimacy with their environments in their experience of time. Her first monograph, *The Life Course in Old English* Poetry, was published by Cambridge University Press in 2023, and explores depictions of human ageing in Old English verse.





In January 2023 we welcomed Dr Melek Karataş to the French department, covering Prof. Ailes' Leverhulme Fellowship. We are pleased that she has since been appointed as postdoctoral research assistant (January 2024 – August 2025) to work on Professor Kathleen Kennedy's British Academyfunded project on the manuscripts of the city of Bristol. Melek's research brings together medieval literature, visual culture and gender theory. She has a particular interest in illuminated vernacular manuscripts, especially the manuscripts of the Roman de la Rose. Dr Mary Bateman joined the department in April 2023 as lecturer in medieval English literature, based in the English department. Mary was previously a postdoctoral researcher at Heinrich-Heine University in Düsseldorf, where she supported Professor Miriam Edlich-Muth on the DFG-funded project 'The Medieval Bevis-Tradition in Multi-Text Manuscript Contexts'. Her recent book, Local Place and the Arthurian Tradition in England and Wales, 1400-1700



(Boydell & Brewer, 2023) was awarded the 2023 Dhira B. Mahoney prize.

In January 2024, Bristol PhD graduates **Dr Emily Wride** and **Dr Marcus Jones** began work on Giovanni Varelli's ERC-funded SCRIBEMUS project. Their postdoctoral positions are hosted by the University of Bristol in 2024 (Wride) and 2024-25 (Jones), working on relationships between southern European musical notations in the tenth century.



Dr Melanie Shaffer joined the Department of Music in August 2024, for a two-year UKRI/Marie Curie International Fellowship, working on neumed Latin poetry and hymns in medieval Iberia.



Research Seminars

The CMS hosted 16 seminars during the 2023–24 academic year, eight in the Autumn of 2023 and eight in the Spring of 2024. Invited speakers included the University of Bristol Vice Chancellor -- a Renaissance art historian -- one scholar from Switzerland, three from the United States, and the remaining from the UK (Bristol, East Anglia, Cambridge, Lancaster, Surrey, and York). The seminars were held in the Arts Complex on Thursday afternoons from 16:00-17:15 and included a question-andanswer session at the end and an opportunity for further discussion after the conclusion of the event. Two seminars took place at the Lord Mayor's Chapel in Bristol in conjunction with Bristol Cathedral and Bristol 650, an initiative celebrating the 650th anniversary of the royal charter granting administrative independence to Bristol. All sessions were in person and open to the public. CMS owes a huge debt to the seminar convener, Eileen Gardiner, for putting together a wonderful programme.

Conferences

2023-2024 was a bumper year for conferences and conferences sessions organized by CMS. CMS brought three conferences to Bristol in 2023-2024:

3-5 April 2024. *The Association for Art History's Annual Conference.*

As part of the Association's 50th Anniversary conference Sophie Kelly, Peter Dent, Lucy Donkin, and Beth Williamson, together with Naomi Speakman (British Museum), organised a double session on 'Ecologies of Visual Culture in the Global Middle Ages'. The speakers were Naomi Speakman (British Museum), Meg Bernstein (Alfred University) & Meg Boulton (York), Mads Vedel Heilskov (Aarhus), Zoe Appelby (Case Western), Jamie Forde (Edinburgh), Jessica Barker (Courtauld). Papers ranged from the British Isles and the Mediterranean to Mexico and West Africa and considered works including a wooden citole; an ivory horn; and mosaics in marble, glass and shell. The session was well attended and generated lively discussion.

27-29 June 2024. Society for International Brut Studies Conference.

Bristol hosted the triennial Society for International Brut Studies conference at St James' Priory (organisers: Marianne Ailes, Steve De Hailes, Helen Fulton, Ad Putter, Leah Tether and Shauna Roach). The conference considered the wider Brut chronicle tradition from all angles and disciplines, including art history, literature, manuscript studies, and historical studies. There were excellent papers by Bristol postgraduates (Rachel Tod, Tim Watson, Maria Rupprecht, Max Fincher) and staff (Helen Fulton, Ad Putter, Mary Bateman). The plenary speaker was Julia Marvin (Notre Dame). A highlight of the conference was a public event with Marianne Ailes in conversation with the bestselling Somerset-based author Amy Jeffs; this was very well attended with the room filled to capacity.

3-6 July 2024. 26th British Legal History Conference: Insiders and Outsiders in the History of Law.

Gwen Seabourne (with Dr Joanna McCunn, an early modern legal history specialist in the Law School) hosted the British Legal History Conference, which took place in the Humanities Building in Bristol, 3-6 July 2024. The conference theme was 'Insiders and Outsiders in the History of Law.' This conference featured several papers on medieval legal subjects, from the identities of medieval judges, through the use of seals to the place of the Devil in medieval legal history. There was also a wonderful plenary lecture by Dr Carissa Harris, of Temple University, USA, a specialist in medieval and early modern literature, on the varied meanings of *ancilla* and issues of reproductive freedom. This was chaired by Ad Putter, and conference delegates found it extremely stimulating and boundary-expanding. The plenary, and the conference more generally, showed the potential for future CMS collaboration with scholars in Law departments at Bristol and beyond.

3-6 July 2024. Leeds International Medieval Congress

CMS medievalists organised eight conference sessions at Leeds International Medieval Congress (IMC 2024), 3-6 July, and hosted an exceptionally lively reception, which we will certainly want to repeat. At the reception Helen Fulton was presented with her Festschrift (see further under section 13). Sessions were as follows:

Annual Postgraduate Conference 2024

The *Bodies and Boundaries* 2024 CMS PGR conference was a resounding success. Taking place over two days (11th-12th April), the conference welcomed 40 in-person and 47 online delegates all engaging in discussions on the theme of bodies and boundaries within medieval studies. Delegates explored a wide array of concepts from fields including History, Literature, Art History, Archaeology, Musicology and Law. We had the privilege of hosting as keynotes speakers: **Dr Alice Jorgensen** (Trinity College Dublin, English); **Dr Jack Hartnell** (University of East Anglia, Art History); and **'Dr Henry Parkes** (University of Nottingham, Musicology).

Alongside our fantastic keynote speakers, the conference hosted ten paper sessions with presentations on fascinating and engaging topics, in the following panels:

The conference also featured a lively social program which included: a walking tour led by Dr Evan Jones; a workshop with Schola Cantorum at St James' Priory, conducted by Professor Emma Hornby; a visit by the South West Anarchy Research Project Team; and a presentation by Dr Stuart Prior about work at the Hartygrove Site. Each of these immersive experiences allowed delegates to fully engage with the conference theme and we are extremely grateful to Dr Jones, Professor Hornby, Dr Prior and the SWARP team for their involvement.



Reading Groups

Old French Reading Group


During the academic year, two Old French reading groups ran: Corin Corley led a group for Intermediate readers of Old French; Melek Karatas and Matt Lampitt led the group for beginners. The students themselves submit texts which they are working on for the group to study together. The intermediate group also hosts researchers from other institutions, enhancing Bristol's reputation as a leader in the field. The Old French reading groups will continue in 2024-2025 with a Beginner and Intermediate group.

Medieval Welsh Reading Group

This reading group, open to all staff and postgraduates, is convened by Luciana Cordo Russo; it will run in 2024-2025 subject to demand.

Old English Reading Group

This group is open to all, whether familiar with the language or new to it, and requires no preparation in advance. It is convened by Harriet Soper and began running in the spring of 2024. Since then, the group has enjoyed making its way through *The Wanderer* and is now looking forward to beginning *Judith* in the autumn. In the future, OERG will continue to run each term from Week 6 onwards.



New for 2024-25: Manuscripts Reading Group

A "manuscripts reading group" for staff and students will run fortnightly from Autumn 2024. This will be a relaxed, low- to no-prep group meeting to discuss a folio or two from a particular medieval or early modern manuscript (either digitised online or via our own Special Collections, who are keen to be involved).

Visiting Professors

Visiting Professors 2023-2024 and 2024-2025

In 2023-24, we hosted:

Professor Leslie Zarker Morgan (Loyola Uni- \Diamond versity Maryland) as a visiting professor on the Benjamin Meaker distinguished Professor scheme. Professor Morgan gave two research papers to members of the School of Modern Languages and the Centre for Medieval Studies. Additionally, Professor Morgan is collaborating with Professor Ailes in the development of tools for teaching Franco-Italian, and developing methodology for researching Franco-Italian and Anglo-Norman redactions (and original texts) of chansons de geste. A future output of this collaboration will be a joint paper given at a conference organised in Lyon by the French branch of the Société Rencesvals.

In 2024-2025, we are hosting:

 Professor David Scott Macnab, NWU, South Africa, as Leverhulme Visiting Professor. During his stay (TB1), David Scott Macnab, an internationally renowned expert on medieval hunting and hunting treatises, will give the





English Department's Annual Tucker-Cruse lecture; a CMS seminar; and contribute a masterclass on editing, drawing on his current research project which is an edition of *The Master of Game* for the Early English Text Society.

 Also in TB1 (arriving 1 October), Dr Jelmar Hugen, Lecturer in Historical Dutch Literature, will join us from the University of Leiden as Bristol Next Generation Visiting Researcher, to work on Middle Dutch Arthurian romances from a comparative perspec-



tive. While in Bristol, Dr. Hugen will present: a lecture for the Centre for Medieval Studies Research Seminar series; a guest lecture for the BA English course 'Literature 1150-1550'; and a Masterclass workshop to MA and Ph.D. students of Medieval Studies on Transkribus, an AIpowered handwritten text recognition tool used by medievalists.



The book, *Medieval Literature and Its European Context*, was edited by Helen Fulton's former PhD student, Victoria Flood (University of Birmingham), and includes essays by former Bristol PhD student **Claudio Cataldi** (now Kore University of Enna) and **Ad Putter** (CMS Co-Director). The work honours Helen's magnificent contribution to the study and teaching of medieval Welsh literature, and to her unselfish support of generations of research students and early career researchers.

- Beth Williamson delivered the first lecture in the UoB's 'Autumn Art Lectures' series, tied in with the city-wide 'Bristol 650' celebrations, in the nave of Bristol Cathedral. Beth also gave a public lecture to the Historical Association Bristol Branch showcasing the forthcoming exhibition at the Met Museum in New York and opening at the London National Gallery in January 2025 – Siena: the Rise of Painting, 1300–1350, to the catalogue of which both she and Peter Dent have contributed essays.
