Professor Carenza Lewis and Dr Ian Waites are running a [pop-up expo](#) in Lincoln's Waterside Shopping Centre, offering the opportunity to explore the surprising discoveries made by residents taking part in an archaeological dig on a post-war council estate at Middlefield Lane, Gainsborough. This event takes place as part of ['Being Human'](#), a national festival celebrating humanities research from across the UK. All are welcome to go along and talk to dig

participants to find out what the ['Middlefield Dig'](#) revealed about the estate's history and why it matters; examine the finds; or contribute your own memories of childhood play and ideas about social housing. There's also the chance to take part in lots of fun activities including a hands-on mock excavation, archaeological bingo and a tabletop test-pit dig with prizes available for winners. Recognition for Public Engagement with Research - the Lincoln Award



Having the opportunity to chat to people beyond the University (the public, professionals, business people, children...) offers researchers a chance to have exciting conversations about their research; receive input and opinions, review the bigger picture, come up with new ideas, gain more funding, collect data, and more. In 2018 a new set of Vice Chancellor's Public Engagement with Research Awards was introduced: celebrating and recognising the work that staff, students and teams do in engaging the public with research. Recognition for public engagement with research activities is now being extended and offered as part of the student [Lincoln Award](#). Students may be involved in engaging the public within their own research, or in working with staff and students on other research projects. Engagement activities might include

organising a focus group, giving a demonstration, running a seminar, creating resources for the public, offering people the chance to participate in research, or being involved in wider engagement opportunities such as [Lights, Pint of Science](#) and [Summer Scientist](#). The Lincoln Award also offers students the opportunity to reflect on the range of skills they are developing through engagement activities, including: communication, project management, evaluation, resilience, problem solving, creativity. The towns, cities and villages we all inhabit today were shaped over centuries, but most evidence for this has been obliterated by modern habitation. Professor Lewis' research encompassing academia, media, national heritage organisations and thousands of members of the public has shown how these lost histories can be recovered through excavation squeezed into such unlikely places as back gardens, revealing the impact of major historical phenomena as diverse as the Roman Conquest, the Black Death and World War Two while also enhancing peoples' lives today.
