Pint of Science - Tickets on Sale Monday 8th April!



Pint of Science is an annual international festival taking place in hundreds of bars and pubs, simultaneously showcasing the latest research to all. In 2019, on 20th - 22nd May, Pint of Science will be coming to Lincoln for the first time, providing a chance for the public to discuss research directly with those carrying it out, and offering staff and students the perfect platform to engage a wider audience in their research.

18 researchers from the University of Lincoln will be speaking at **Caffe Portico**, **The Lion and Snake**, and **The Pessimist** for three nights, joining over 300 cities around the world who will be taking part in this global festival.

Talks at Lincoln will cover an expanse of topics, including:

- · 'How humans are changing the Earth myths, law, and the future'
- 'A byte of music'
- 'From farm to fork the agri-robotics revolution'
- · 'Exoplanets: new worlds that are stranger than science fiction'
- 'The Fossdyke: do we underestimate the Iron Age?'
- 'Catching the Black Death latest news and views on history's biggest killer'

At PEARL 2019 Conference Speakers and PEARL 2018-19 Grant-holders inspired staff and students with the exciting diversity of topics and activities engaging the public in research at Lincoln, sharing the importance of engaged research in each of their contexts.

The event showcased 12 speakers in 10-minute rapid-fire research presentations showcasing activities that staff, students and collaborators had conducted engaging the public with research. Topics ranged from agri-forests, RAF 100 Augmented reality, 1960s English council estates, sustainability of pubs in rural communities, and experiences of gender stereotyping. Carenza Lewis, Professor for the Public Understanding of Research at Lincoln, announced the 11 new PEARL grant-funded projects for this year's public engagement research (see below).

At the end was a further opportunity to **showcase** current projects, **ask** questions, **network** and **discuss** public engagement with research at Lincoln during a **poster presentation** and **wine reception**:



In recent years there has been an explosion in the discovery of new planets orbiting stars other than our Sun. Previously the idea of exotic planets orbiting multiple stars has been left purely to science fiction. However, science has now discovered such worlds. We will look at some of these recent discoveries and discuss in the context of potential life. We will finish by considering where the best places to look for life might be, in our own solar system or even moons or large moons around massive exoplanets.

Professor Jon Whitehead | FAT in the 21st Century - too much of a good thing

Essentially, this will be a beginner's guide to the dynamic and, dare I say, sexy world of FAT. Jon will provide an informative and engaging presentation describing some of the highlights of his research journey, which has become increasingly located on understanding the relationship between the wellbeing of an individual's FAT cells and the individual. Highlights include involvement in the discovery of the first monogenic cause of obesity in humans (i.e. a single spelling mistake in a single gene resulting in morbid obesity), and the identification and characterisation of new ways to manipulate FAT cells.

Tuning#1 | Extra-Sonic Practice Series

Over the next few months, the Extra-Sonic Practice research group will be hosting a series of events around the cross-disciplinary theme of 'Tuning'. Thinking and doing with tuning will take us from accents to autotune, eavesdropping to organs. Our first event will feature a performance talk and workshop by artist and lecturer Rebecca Collins (Edinburgh College of Art), based around her Sonic Detective novel Necessary Note. The urgency of the investigation is fuelled by concerns found in heightened forms at the border/margin of the country: the uncertain future of the UK's relationship to Europe; the effects of climate change on coastal landscapes; the waning of industries like manufacturing and coal extraction; the development of globalised logistics. Part performance, part methodological exposition, Rebecca invites you to listen in on a sequence of eavesdropped extracts from the coast of the UK and will share extracts from the forthcoming publication. This will be followed by a series of eavesdropping exercises that have informed the development of this investigation.

Public Lecture | State of the World's Birds: Taking the Pulse of the Planet

We know more about birds than we do about any other comparable group of organisms. Consequently, birds serve as a unique barometer of planetary health. The capacity of birds to fascinate and enthral is unsurpassed. BirdLife's flagship publication—State of the World's Birds—is now established as one of the most authoritative and influential syntheses of its kind, and the latest iteration, launched last year, is already helping to shape the global conservation agenda. This talk, by the report's lead author, will focus on the deteriorating status of birds globally—outlining key trends, emerging threats and the chief drivers of extinction. Although the current situation is ominous, it will also demonstrates that approaches do exist for halting the biodiversity crisis, so long as there is sufficient political will and adequate resourcing.
