PLENARIES



Akua Reindorf is a barrister at Cloisters Chambers specialising in employment, discrimination and human rights law. She is instructed in cases involving polarising and contested identity and equality issues, including appearing for LGB Alliance in the challenge to their charitable status brought by Mermaids, representing James Esses in his case for discrimination because of his gender critical beliefs, and acting for Julie Bindel in her discrimination complaint against Nottingham City Council. In 2021 she conducted the "Reindorf Review" for the University of Essex, which was widely reported as a landmark contribution to the debate on sex and gender.

Akua is a Commissioner of the Equality and Human Rights
Commission and a fee paid Employment Judge. She is Chambers and Partners' Employment Junior of the Year and is featured in The Lawyer's Hot 100 for 2022. She is to be appointed King's Counsel in 2023

Joanna Cherry KC is the MP for Edinburgh Southwest and Chair of the UK Parliament's Joint Committee on Human Rights. She was the SNP's Spokesperson on Justice and Home Affairs from 2015-2021. In 2019 she led the successful 'Cherry Case' against Boris Johnson's unlawful prorogation of the UK Parliament. She was also a co-litigant in the case against the UK Government at the EU Court of Justice, which established that Article 50 could be unilaterally revoked. Joanna was called to the bar in 1995 and took silk in 2009. From 2003-2008 she served as Standing Junior Counsel to the Scottish Government. From 2008-2011 she served as Crown Counsel and was one of the first specialist sex crimes prosecutors in Scotland's pioneering National Sex Crimes Unit.

PLENARIES



Julie Bindel is a leading voice in the global campaign to end male violence towards women and children. She co-founded Justice for Women and the Emma Humphreys Memorial Prize. Her books include *Straight Expectations*, *The Pimping of Prostitution* and *Feminism for Women*.

Helen Joyce is Director of Advocacy at Sex Matters and author of *TRANS: When Ideology Meets Reality*, named as a book of the year in 2021 by the *Observer, Spectator* and *Times.* Helen was a staff journalist at *The Economist* from 2005 to 2022, holding several senior positions, including Britain Editor, Finance Editor and International Editor. She has a PhD in mathematics from UCL.

Kathleen Stock is a contributing writer at Unherd, and the author of *Material Girls: Why Reality Matters for Feminism*. Until October 2021, she was a Professor of Philosophy at University of Sussex. Her earlier academic research concerned philosophical questions about sexual orientation, objectification, fiction, imagination, and pretence. She regularly discusses gender, gender identity, and sex, and their effects on women and girls, in public writing and speaking. She was awarded an OBE for services to higher education in 2020, and is a Founding Faculty Fellow at UATX.

2 Teaching about sex and gender in schools Room W3.01

The DfE guidance in 2021 achieved a long-held feminist goal of compulsory Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) inclusive of sexual orientation, as well as wider issues of intimate partner violence and coercive control. At the same time, there is a widespread programme of outreach into schools by proponents of ideas of innate gender identity and that sex is a spectrum, often taught under the wider remit of equalities or inclusion. What would a truly feminist RSE look like?


