


# Examiners expectations

- presents an original contribution to knowledge
- is based on relevant theory
- uses sound methodology
- is publishable



# Criticality and argument

- selecting relevant literature
- synthesising literature
- critically evaluating literature
- justifying own research
- supporting claims with literature and evidence
- interpreting findings in relation to literature
- evaluting own research
- showing original contribution
- drawing implications



### PGR as a researcher

- research skills
- independence in research
- ability to discuss research in depth, clearly and with confidence




## Structure of dissertation
