



CyGen Conference: Children and Youngsters Online Behavior

27th November 2018

The event marks the completion of the 2nd year of our Erasmus + KA2 co-funded Cyber Safe Generation and the project's work in Denmark. The CyGen project investigates issues related to the behavior of children and adolescents on the web for the purpose of designing and testing an online tool that involves the target group in consideration and discussion of what is good and safe internet behavior. The project uses user-involved design methods and is also based on anthropologically-inspired field studies among the project's target audience, which are children aged 10-14 and adults who have professional or family relationships with members of the target audience. In the project, a network-based tool is designed and tested, which will be made available to all interested parties after the end of the project. The project is carried out in collaboration with two foreign universities and a primary school and is funded by Erasmus + funds in the period 1/9 – 2016 to 31/8 2019.

The presentation presents the findings we have made in this collaboration and how these shed light on both the opportunities and challenges Danish schoolchildren meet in their everyday lives in relation to digital behavior.</p>

The efforts have been made in close cooperation with the behavioral design agency WeLearn. The paper will address the results already given to both behavioral behavior and the way in which a close partnership can help bring the people at the center.</p>
