

Ireland VS. Denmark




About



Denmark's voters have begun casting their votes for the country's local elections. But how does it work? And how different is it to Irish local elections?







Important Note:



In both countries, *proportional* representation systems are used during elections.



This means that during elections, candidates and groups are elected in proportion to the number of votes they receive!







In Denmark,

A Party-list system is used. On a ballot paper, Danish voters will be given a list of candidates. They are then allowed to vote for one candidate. This vote then goes towards the candidates party!










In Ireland,





A single-transferable vote system or STV for short! On a ballot paper, Irish voters will be given a list of candidates. They are then allowed to vote for the candidates in order of preference.





But why do they do this?



No vote goes to waste!



In Denmark, the party will still receive a vote and in Ireland, the voters' next preferred candidate will get a vote.
